Restorative Conversations

Restorative practices aim to teach students positive behavior skills, encourage them to accept responsibility for their actions, and teach them how to make amends to restore relationships and community health.

All of these practices support and derive from a school culture that intends to develop strong relationships, trust, positive interactions, and thoughtful development of student agency. (Darling-Hammond et al., 2019)

In successful restorative environments, the focus moves away from punishment and compliance. Instead, the educator seeks to create learning experiences that develop new skills and facilitate positive relationships with all community members.
